

Program Note.

This piece is a meditation on the painting *Prometheus* by the American Magic Realist artist Les Harris, currently in the Amarinthine Museum in Baltimore, Maryland. In Greek mythology, Prometheus, a Titan, gave the gift of fire to humankind. Punished by Zeus for this transgression, he was chained to a mountain top, where an eagle tore out his liver each day, and was healed each night.

Notes.

- 1. Tuning is B D# A# D G# A# D# A
- 2. The piece creates jagged melodic lines by combining sets of three, four and five 16th notes. The time signatures are included to indicate overall phrasing, but exact counting is not as important as maintaining the equality of 16th note durations, and grouping according to the barring and accents indicated.
 - 3/4 is notated as 12/16 and 9/8 as 18/16 for this reason and for consistency.
- 3. The tuning and emphasis on open notes are to take advantage of the resonant capabilities of the Brahms guitar. Let notes ring as much as possible.
- 4. Tempo is between 85-95bpm and 110-120bpm from bar 74
- 5. Play the natural harmonics(ie. bar 1 and onwards) slightly more with the flesh of the RH *p* to give a more subdued, muted tone. The harmonics should be 'duller' in sound in comparison to the fretted notes.
- 6. At bar 74, the first beat of the tuplet is golpe on the bridge with the LH thumb (reaching down), the second beat is tambour on the harmonic node at fret XII using the RH with side of finger i. The third beat is tambour on the harmonic node at fret IX with the side of finger i.
- 7. Draw the LH *i* finger slowly across the strings (low to high) behind the nut.
- 8. Two scores are provided for clarity. A study score including three staves, scordature, actual pitch and tablature, as well as a standard scordatura score.





















Note 6: 1. Golpe on bridge with LH thumb
